Spring has Sprung


Gardening continues for Generous Gardeners in a careful socially distanced Gloucester.

Despite the tragic pandemic, Generous Gardeners volunteers continue to plant and maintain many public gardens in Gloucester. We have planted 2,500 pansies in planters and small spaces all over the city. Spring flowers are giving many walkers and runners around the city a mental boost.

The massive tulip display surrounding the Fishermen's Wives Memorial may begin blooming in May, although it could be earlier given the temperate weather. We planted 19,100 new tulips over the previous plantings, so it should be a lovely display of color moving from pink to purple, yellow to orange, and then red. Generous Gardeners also planted 2,000 red tulips at the Elizabeth Gordon Smith Garden that we renovated last year. The ten flowering trees will also be blooming in succession this spring. The witch hazel tree was a welcome burst of color in February.

Hellebores 'Brandywine,' commonly known as Lenten rose, blooms in early March even in the snow. Generous Gardeners planted these striking flowers at the Elizabeth Gordon Smith Garden and the newly renovated Fitz Henry Lane Garden.

Celosia argentea cristata 'Chief Gold,' commonly known as cockscomb, is a summer annual with a flower that resembles the folds of a brain. Generous Gardeners planted this fun flower in the gold bed on Stacy Boulevard.

Dianthus 'Pink Jolk,' also known as sweet William or pink, is a shocking pink annual that is planted in profusion in the pink beds surrounding the Fishermen's Wives Memorial. Combined with the pink Knockout roses and the 'Snow Princess' allysum, the memorial is a destination for a rest on the benches surrounded by beauty.

VOLUNTEER WITH GENEROUS GARDENERS

We currently have over 50 volunteers associated with our organization and welcome new volunteers who are interested in our mission. Caring for our gardens takes the majority of our volunteer time. We plant, weed, rake, water and deadhead. Susan Kelly maintains an email list of interested helpers who are notified of the tasks, time and location each week (more often if necessary), and volunteers come when they are available to help. There is never any obligation or commitment. This

work is ongoing from early spring to late fall.

Volunteering at one of our fundraising events is another way to participate. We also have a volunteer board of directors that keeps the organization focused on its mission and works with sponsors, grants, garden designers, website review, and finances.
